Criminology [WBQ WEW 1.2, 2.1 and PSE 1.1-1.3, 2.3, 3.3]

Criminology is the scientific study of crime, criminals and victims, and society's responses to them.

The following interactive sessions will ask students to consider some of the key debates in relation to crime and criminal justice.

Riots, protest and public disorder

Law [WBQ PSE 3.3, ESW Problem-Solving]

Underpinning society and governance is the UK legal system. Students studying law at A-level or those pursuing other allied qualifications, including the WBQ, can develop a range of transferable skills that can be used in business, law, accounting and finance, and a host of other career paths.

The following sessions will explore legal judgements and statutes, while examining the economic, theoretical, philosophical, political and social aspects of the law and its role in society.

Knowing your legal and human rights: an interactive moot court debate

- the principles of the Human Rights Act.A divided house will debate a motion.

Knowing your legal and human rights: a consumer rights workshop
